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Well, welcome to the Unpacked Podcast. We're unpacking the reality behind today's public schools.

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I'm Mickey O'Neill. I'm your host, and I have Jason Melma, superintendent of

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the Ingham Intermediate School District, joining me today.

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Introduce yourself, please, Mr. Melma. Hello.

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Thanks so much for joining us. I'm Jason Melma, superintendent here at Ingham ISD.

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Well, thanks for joining us. This is part two in our series talking about what

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it is that intermediate school districts are and what they do.

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And today we're going to talk a little bit about governance.

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Can you talk about the structure of an ISD and how it works?

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Sure. In our first episode, I kind of talked about the continuation,

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or the continuum, I should say, of services that are provided and how ISDs fit in together.

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So we have the Michigan Department of Education, and you have 56 ISDs within

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the state, and then you have local school districts that operate underneath

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those, whether it be charter schools, PSAs, public school academies,

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or our LEAs, local education agencies.

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And so the governance structure kind of works to where ISDs work in the middle

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as an intermediary, thinking about the systems and structures, the reports.

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Auditing could be for pupil accounting, auditing standards, different things

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that we do that provide information that goes up to the state.

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The state provides information back through us that then we filter out to our local districts.

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Okay. Can you talk about how the difference with board of education structure?

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Like what is, how does it work at a local district versus an intermediate school district?

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For sure. So local boards of education are actually elected by the public.

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It's a nonpartisan race.

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It isn't an R or a D thing. It's just somebody who's interested in supporting students.

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And so they go through the clerk, actually file for being a candidate,

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and then they are elected by the public.

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What's unique about intermediate school districts is our boards of

education

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are elected by the boards of education of local districts.

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So going back to statute 1962, it actually defines that on the first Monday

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in June, electors from the local boards of education shall come forward and

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cast their ballot. That's pretty specific.

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That's very specific going back to how long it's been around and how long it's

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been operating like this.

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But just like a local board of education, the candidate has to file to be a

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candidate. So do boards of education, interested board of education members for ISDs.

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Now, one unique thing, we cannot have more than two ISD board members from one local district.

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So, for example, you can't have ever more than two board members out of Mason

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or two board members out of East Lansing or two board members out of Holt.

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It's just the requirements for how the state works.

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So that leads me to a question that some viewers might or listeners might not know about.

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What local school districts are part of Ingham Intermediate School District?

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Sure. So we have 12 traditional schools.

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We have four kind of more rural when we think about Stockbridge,

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Dansville, Leslie and Webberville.

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And we have districts that kind of operate in more of a suburban setting when

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we think about Williamston, Haslett, East Lansing, Okemos, Holt, Waverly, and Mason.

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And then we have a district that operates as an urban district,

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and that would be the Lansing School District. That's our largest school district.

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So 12 traditional, and then we have charter schools here as well.

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How many students does Ingham Intermediate School District serve every year?

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So we are the eighth largest ISD out of 56, and we serve between 41,000 and

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42,000 students currently, which is pretty exciting. That is fantastic.

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What other things that do you think the public might want to know about a structure

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between a local district and an ISD that, you know, local districts don't really

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report to an ISD, but sometimes that can be confusing to the public?

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So I think that's an important topic in and of itself.

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I don't have, or our Board of Education doesn't have a responsibility with respect

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to local superintendents or staff members at a local district.

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I have no control over who the starting quarterback is, who's going to be the

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lead in the play, who's going to sit first chair and band.

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None of those things flow through the ISD. We work in collaboration with local

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districts to provide those services and support.

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So governance, local boards of education hire their local superintendent.

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Our board of education hires the superintendent here. And so those are separate

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as far as how the governance overall works.

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Now, there are some requirements when we think about special education.

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So, ISDs receive funds from our Department of Education, and we are subrecipient

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of IDEA funds, IDEA, Individual Disabilities Education Act.

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We are not allowed to disperse those

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funds past ourselves. We can't have sub-recipients with sub-recipient.

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So we are responsible for those dollars.

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They flow out to local districts in support of students, but that's where compliance factors come in.

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We try to support local districts to make sure that students are receiving FAPE,

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a free and appropriate public education.

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And we work through when there are challenges or disagreements that might be

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in existence and make sure that students are receiving the right services and

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supports. So we do have some statutory things that we do. Pupil accounting was

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With respect to pupil accounting, we actually audit our local districts,

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go up to the Michigan Department of Education, and then they audit us.

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So we work kind of in the middle sometimes when we think about some of those statutory things.

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But I don't hire anybody within our local districts. There are local boards

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our board hires and approves the superintendent here for the Ingram IC.

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We can touch on funding in a whole other podcast, but can you just give a basic

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understanding of where the funding comes from for ISDs versus a local?

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Sure. Local school districts work, as I mentioned, the people accounting factor

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from what's known as an FDE, a full-time enrollment.

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And that means that the number of students that are there multiplied by what

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the legislator designates as the full-time enrollment equals the amount of dollars

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that are distributed to that local school district.

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At an ISD, we have a millage that supports general education.

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We have a millage that supports special education.

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We have a millage that supports career and technical education.

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So taxpayers see that on their tax bills, right? They actually see those on their tax bills.

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So we are supported by those functions with respect to an ISD.

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And then obviously we have grants and some other things that flow through us

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that continue to support students and families here throughout the area as well.

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Okay. All right. Well, I think that's all we have time for today.
